



### FORD EMPLOYEE DISCOUNT AVAILABLE TO ALL US BUYERS

Pord dealership prices just got interesting for many shoppers across the U.S. The company kicked off a nationwide program on April 3rd, giving its Ford employee discount pricing to the general public buying most new Ford or Lincoln vehicles.

Launched under the banner "Ford Motor Company: From America, For America," this plan means regular car shoppers pay the same price Ford employees pay. Ford pitches the move as a "handshake deal," suggesting it aims to help buyers navigate uncertain economic times.

The discount covers a wide range of options for the 2024 and 2025 lineups, applying to vehicles with gas engines, hybrid systems, plug-in hybrid setups, and diesel Ford and Lincoln vehicles.

However, buyers need to check the fine print. This employee pricing deal doesn't apply to everything wearing a

Ford or Lincoln badge. It doesn't apply to the F-150 Raptor and Bronco Raptor, along with other specialty or limited-edition Mustang and Bronco models.

Ford also excludes the large, newly redesigned 2025 Expedition and Lincoln Navigator SUVs, plus the entire Super Duty truck lineup from the program.

For those considering a Ford electric vehicle, this new employee pricing discount offers an additional incentive. Ford stated that it stacks with its separate Power Promise program, which the company extended through June 30, 2025. That program gives qualifying EV retail purchasers a complimentary home charger and covers standard installation costs.

Ford publicly links the entire "From America, For America" initiative to its domestic manufacturing operations. The company highlights its large number of U.S. hourly autoworkers and its strategy of "assembling where we sell," framing the as Ford supporting American jobs.

This widespread employee pricing offer marks a huge, though likely temporary, pricing move by Ford in the U.S. market. For car shoppers currently considering a qualifying new Ford or Lincoln, investigating the potential savings through this Ford employee discount program could prove beneficial in the coming weeks, months, or even years.

#### OL' RED

fell in love with Mustangs as a kid, but waited a very long time to find the perfect one here in Ol' Red. You see, I was born and raised in Detroit, into a huge family of autoworkers; I'm the oldest of 11, and both my parents are from real large Irish-Catholic families (my 3 kids have



31 first cousins, and I've got about as many myself—gave up trying to count mine a long time ago). My father was a toolmaker and among my many uncles and aunts, grandparents, great aunts/uncles, etc., just about every house had someone working in the auto industry, mostly

for GM and a couple for Chrysler/Dodge,

but none at Ford.

I suppose it was my early rebel or contrarian streak that had me falling in love in high school with a particular red '90 Saleen hatchback that the owner of a local grocery store tried to sell to me, because growing up, just about everyone in my family drove GMs, bought on the family pricing plan. And much of my childhood was spent cussing under the hoods of Chevys at engineering I didn't like. Like most young kids, that slick


Saleen was way out of my budget, thus my first vehicle was a '90 Escort GT, i.e. a poor kid's mustang-ish ride.

Fast forward a couple decades, and the middleage desire to get a classic Mustang was coming on hard: I wanted something classic that I could drive (occasionally), was all-original, and needed little work. I didn't need another project, because here in Bergen



County and unlike the Midwest - they didn't build houses in the '70s with big garages, so my one-car garage didn't have room for much of project. Enter the 1969 Mach 1 that I found, which we affectionally call "Ol' Red!"

Ol' Red was originally bought at Koons Ford in Falls Church, Virginia by a gent who, fresh out of graduate school, and with a second



baby on the way, [allegedly] used his first big bonus as a lobbyist to buy his dream '69 Mach 1, much to the chagrin of his first wife. A couple years later, after the '72 election, they found their way to Tallahassee and statehouse lobbying in Florida with a third child soon to be born. Ol' Red found himself living in a great climate,

> in a garage, and rarely driven. (In my due diligence, I tracked the title registration to help confirm the odometer hadn't rolled and this family tale I was told). Maybe because his first wife never got over this splurge on a '69 Stang, but soon a second wife and two more children arrived in Florida.

> I was told he dearly loved Ol' Red, always keeping it garaged, with receipts of every performed. Heck, not just the receipts of

every service, but hand-written entries and diaries yearby-year in a manual book with diagrams of everything, including when he had it detailed, and the original Koons Ford sales invoice. He even saved this '69 model year brochure, that has my model on the cover. I'm guessing he got that when ordering it, but let me tell you, reading it is like something out of a Mad Men episode, reflecting a very different era. Of course, I got all of this when I became Ol' Red's second owner. Coincidentally, I'm a guy who also bought a vehicle at the same Koons dealership when I lived in D.C. in the early 2000s, myself then also working as a lobbyist!

Here's where Ol' Red and I met, with a bit of help from Lady Luck: unfortunately, this gent died young, twenty years before I purchased Ol' Red. By then all his

five kids were grown, none lived in Florida, and the second wife didn't drive a manual. So, Ol' Red was fated to the back of a garage under a cover, and out of mind. And as unfortunately becomes the case when there are kids from multiple marriages – and the wills or trusts aren't done well - upon the second wife's passing, the kids found themselves in court fighting over the estate, where ultimately a judge ordered everything sold at an Estate Auction. Here's some free lawyer advice (even though, full disclaimer, my knowledge of wills, trusts and estates was limited to prepping for the bar exam, which long ago escaped to the recesses of my memories!): don't let classic cars get sold at estate instead of car auctions because estate auctioneers' priority is clearing the estate, not maximizing the value of a car like at Mecum, Barrett-Jackson, or even regional ones like the annual fall Hersey auction. Especially ones like Ol' Red with (then) only 48.5k original miles.


All these factors — including that it had the exterior/interior color combination I really wanted — and of course a price that was practically stealing it, induced me to end my search for the perfect classic '69 and go

with a 351 instead of trying to hold out for an even rarer 428 Cobra Jet. Given its condition, I put very few miles on it each year, but still get that immense satisfaction when Ol' Red fires up each spring, rumbling to life and growling just as he likely did when coming off the line in Metuchen, then configured as only 56 others out of the 299,036 Mustangs Ford built in 1969. Most miles I ever put on it in a year was one Hershey PA drive, seen here at the annual fall parts swap/auction when I wanted to confirm its real value from actual buyer offers,

as that is more accurate than an appraisal (I really did practically steal it)!

The numbers match, and everything is original except that I upgraded to a petronix electronic ignition several years ago (but still have the original in a box). I keep all the old records, sales invoice, and aforementioned brochure hermetically sealed, but periodically take it out to remind my kids (and stepgrandsons) of Ford's apropos admonition on page 13: "Get a Mustang... and have something to tell your grandchildren. Mustang makes it happen." And one of best things about Ol' Red – well he perfectly matches my favorite motorcycle! My three kids and three step-kids (or grandsons) better never sell him...

Anniversay Edition GT. Since it was the first time the car had even been driven on the street, they chose the display class. Friday used to be a day for

It surprised me to find that there was an Indy 500 Pace Car edition from each of the three years Mustang had that honor: 1964, 1979 and 1994.

All in all a great show. I even managed to run into former GSRMC members, Bob & Sue Lyons, who moved




